






OBJECTIVES


- Qualititative research

- Document analysis






When Sushi goes bad

CONCLUSION: SOCIAL SCIENCE-IN-THE-MAKING

"[...] Given this negative character, it makes no sense to crystallize first principles or seek natural laws that generate best cases. Instead, I practice arts of noticing. I comb through the mess of existing worlds-in-the-making, looking for treasures—each distinctive and unlikely to be found again, at least in that form. [emphasis added]" (Tsing A.L., 2015, p.191)
